

, and for her strength in the face of adversity. She was never one to sit back and let others take the lead on issues such as improving our community or confronting politicians about infrastructure, development, and community services. Born in 1939 in Brooklyn, NY, Carol grew up in nearby NJ where she taught high school English in the Hoboken area. It was here that she became the president of the Hoboken Teacher's Union, a perfect match for a bright, articulate woman who recognized potential and brought out the best in people. After she retired from teaching, she tutored and mentored high school students who struggled with reading. As she herself noted, "I was a great teacher who was at my best when dealing with difficult students." Carol became one of the first residents of Tuscarora Condo in Worman's Mill ten years ago. She moved to Maryland to be near her only sibling, a younger brother, who lived in Olney. The two were very close. She was on the original Board of Directors of the Tuscarora Condo, spent 9 years on the condo social committee, and published the first condo newsletter. She was a member of the Civic Association Board for 9 years having served as President and Vice-President. She was also active in the NAC4 meetings and linked the issues covered in those meetings to the Civic Association agenda. As president of the Civic Association, Carol organized numerous membership events, from "An evening with the Youngs," a potentially contentious meeting of the family's siblings, in-laws, and parents; to presentations on Frederick's future by those politicians and government employees who make the decisions. She did this not just for the edification of residents, but to give them the opportunity to question politicians and planners directly about the direction their city will take. Carol's knowledge, curiosity, energy and passion will be missed by the Civic Association and the entire Worman's Mill community. On July 26, a memorial service was held at the Clubhouse to honor Carol Goldstein.
