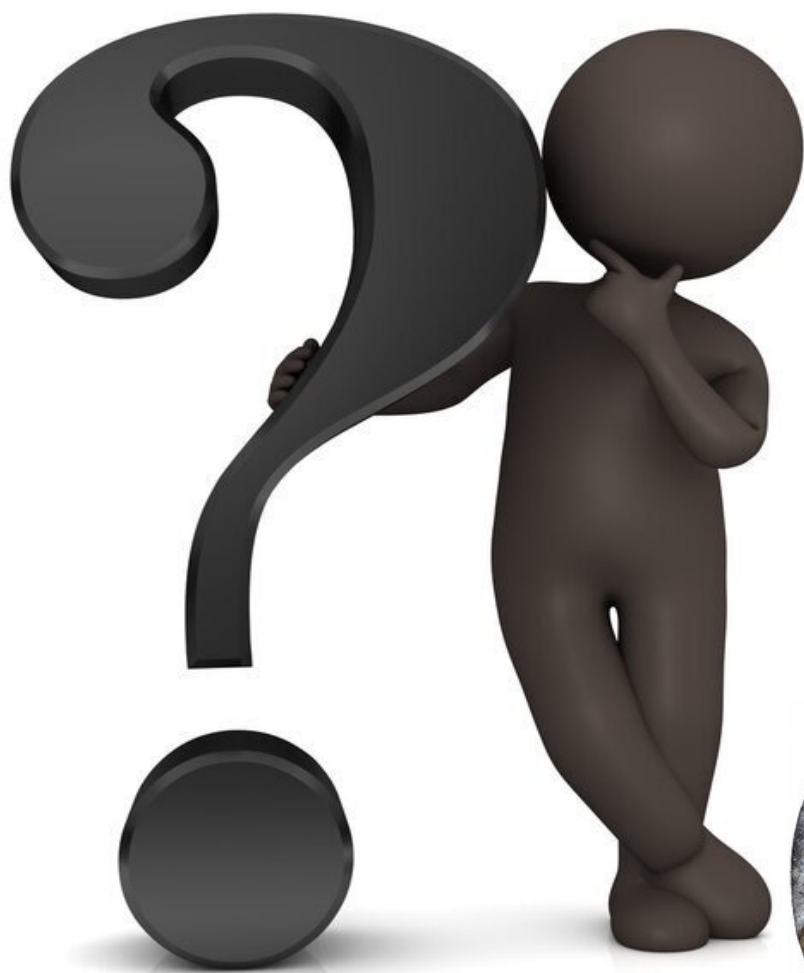

Frederick native who became an American lawyer, author, and amateur poet. He wrote the lyrics to the United States' national anthem, "*The Star-Spangled Banner*."



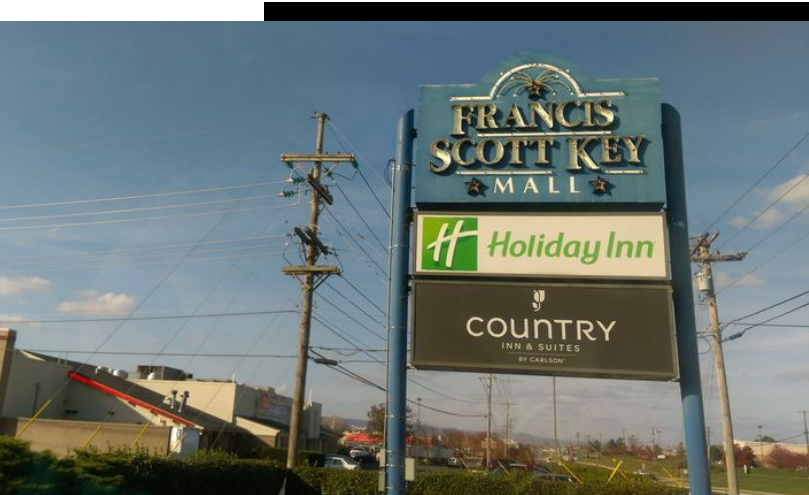

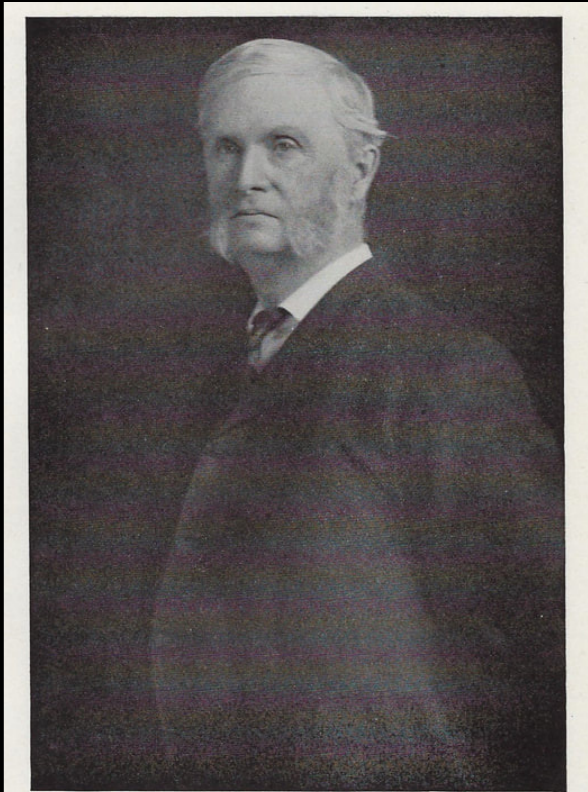


Jacob Engelbrecht (1797-1878)

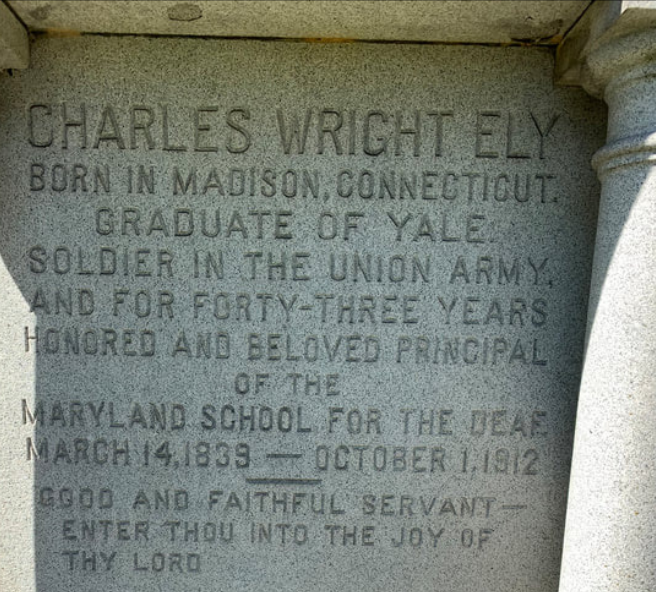

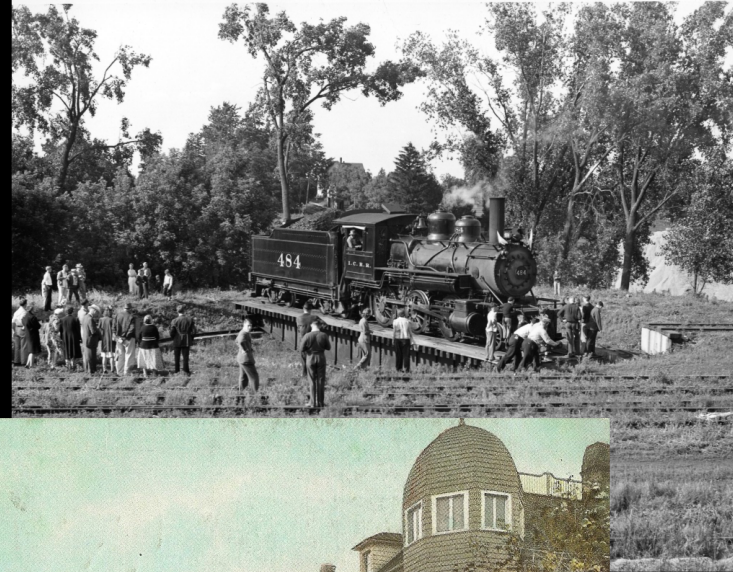
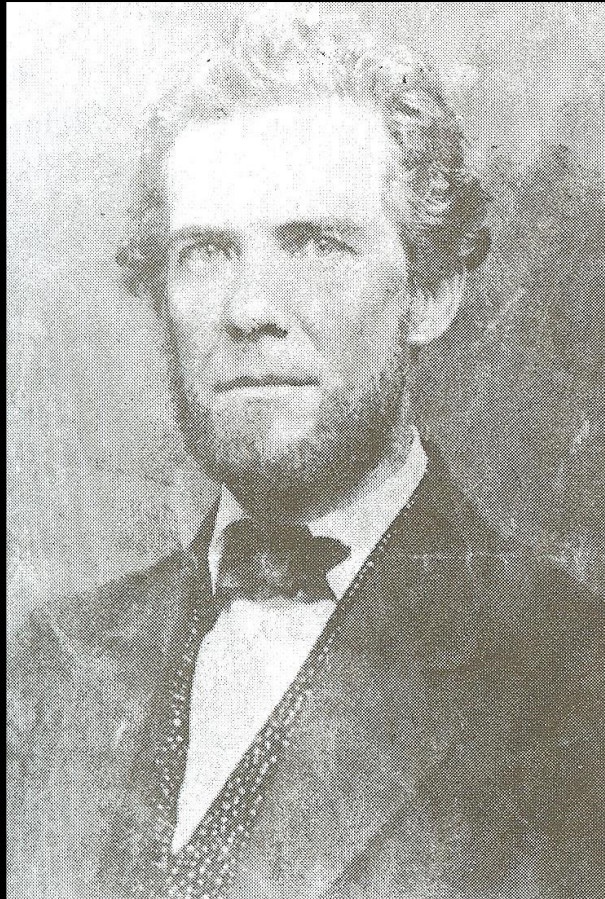
Yale graduate and Union Army Civil War Veteran who was a deaf education pioneer. He served as principal Of MSD from 1870 up through his death in 1912.

Gen. James C. Clarke (1824-1902)



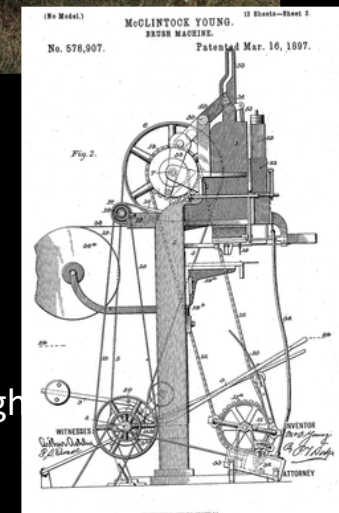
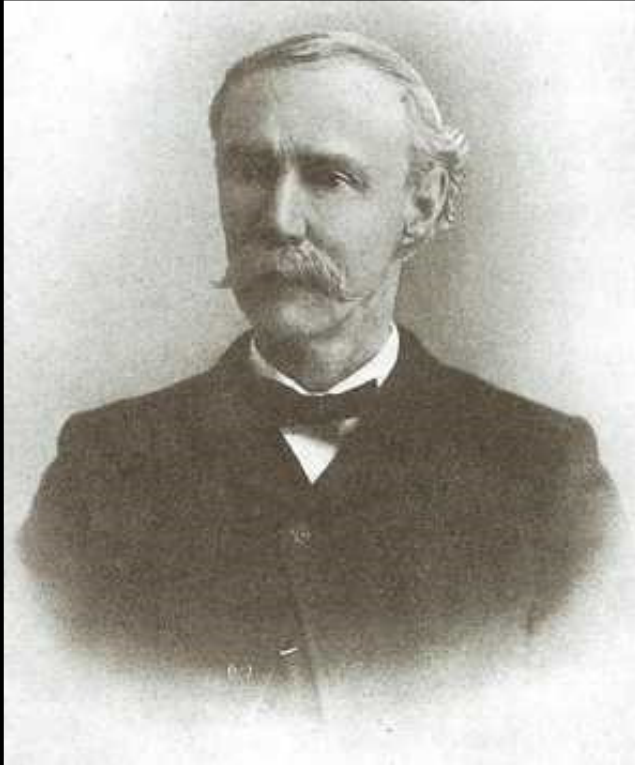

Frederick's greatest inventor. At age 12 invented a steam fire engine. His many patents include a "self-rake" that was bought by McCormack Harvester Company, a bicycle, a match-making machine which was bought by Diamond Match Company, and several brush making machines.

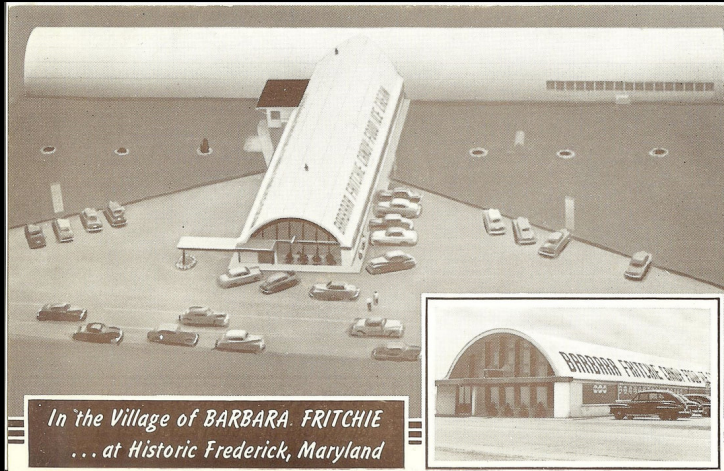
Up from the meadows rich with corn,

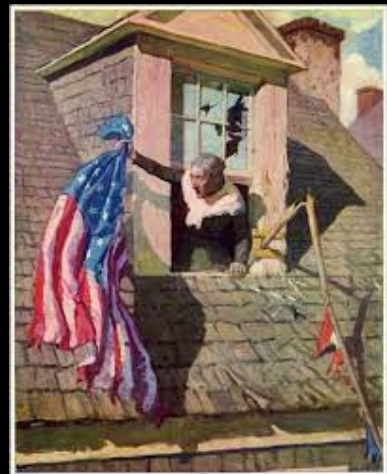

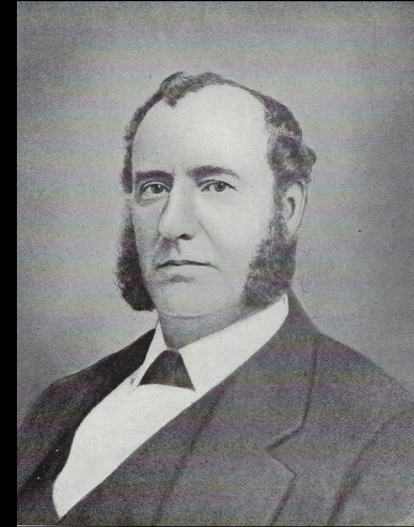

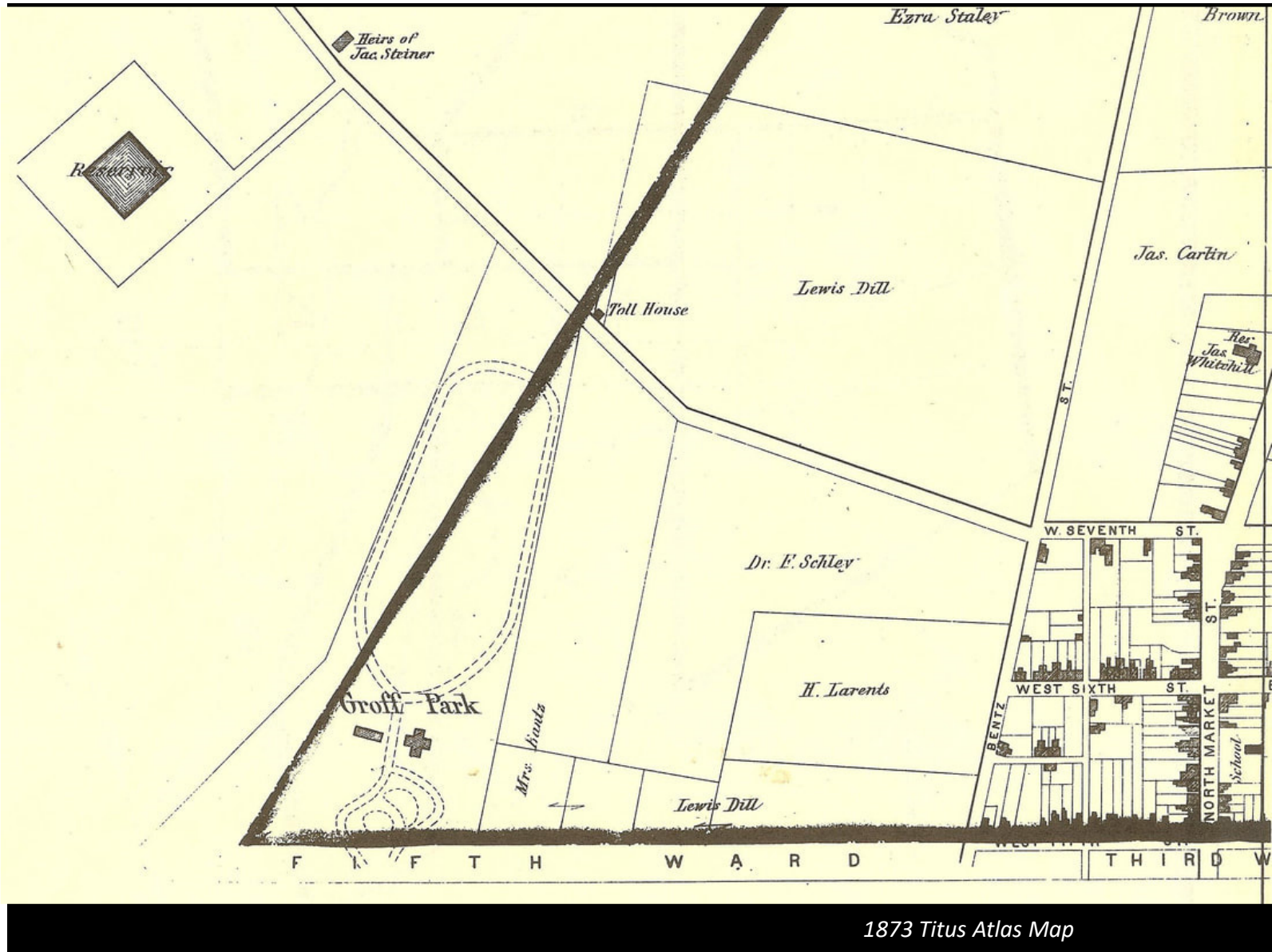
Mrs. Hood donated the land for the Women's College in 1897. This would later become Hood College of Frederick, named for her generosity.

1873 Titus Atlas Map

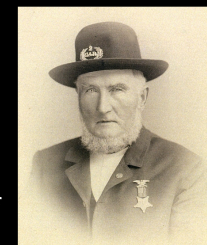
Joseph & Susan Groff



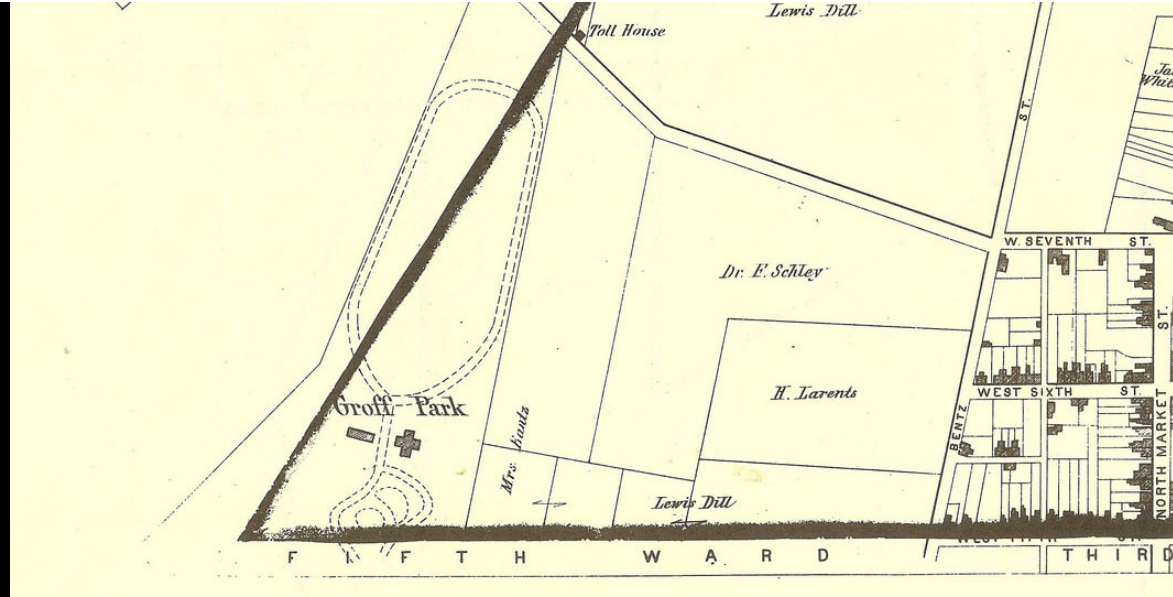
Joseph and Susan Groff were feisty hotel-keepers here in Frederick and demonstrated a great allegiance to the Union and its flag. Joseph was a captain in the Union Army's Potomac Home Brigade and saw military action at Harper's Ferry and Gettysburg's Culp's Hill where he would be wounded. Susan was heralded as a hero when she hid rifles out of reach of invading Confederates who came to Frederick in September, 1862.

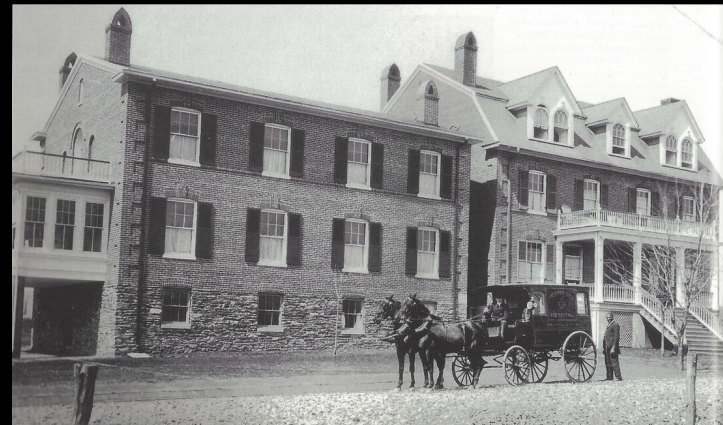
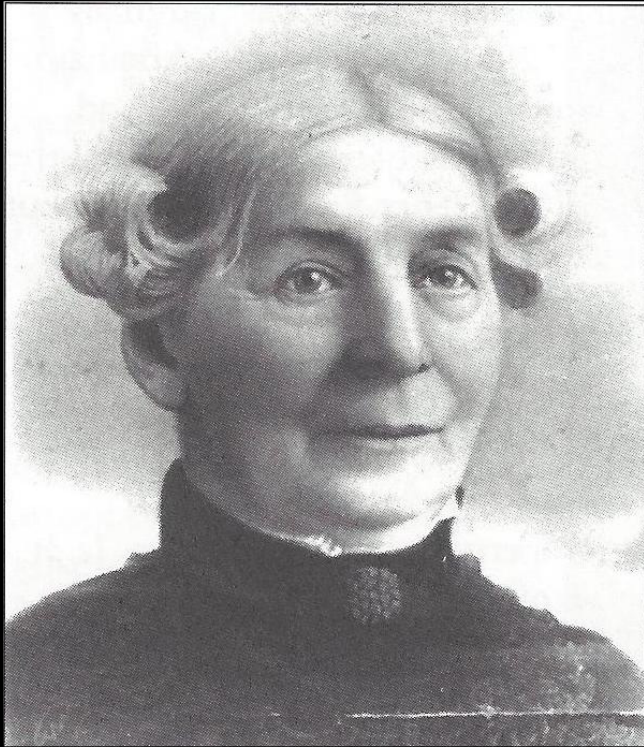
Lewis H. Dill (1821-1894)

Miss Smith was influential in opening of the Record Street Home for the Aged and the building of the FSK Monument In Mount Olivet. Her greatest achievement was opening the Frederick City Hospital in 1902 On land she donated. She served as first president.

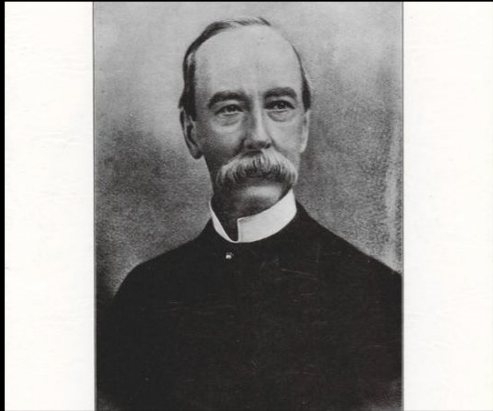
Florence Trail (1854-1944)



Florence Trail and her sisters Bertha and Anna Mary were local leaders in the local suffrage movement from the 1911 founding of the local branch of the *Just Government League* until the Ratification of the 19th Amendment in 1920. Florence served as president of the branch for many years and the sisters hosted many suffrage meetings at their home in Frederick. The sisters had a Profound influence on their grandnephew, Charles McCurdy Mathias who would become an influential congressman.



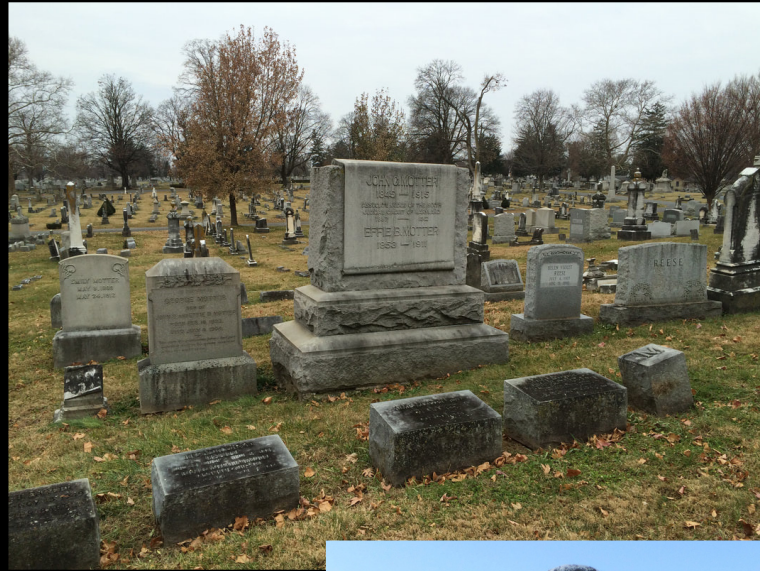
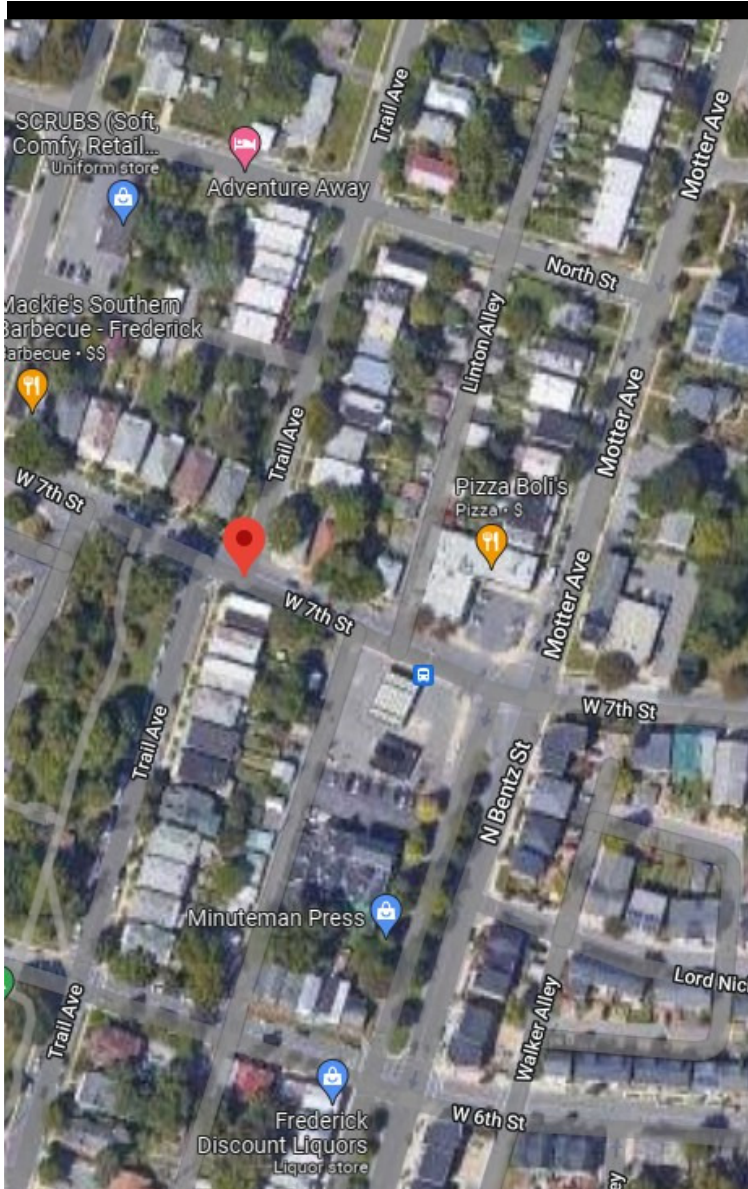

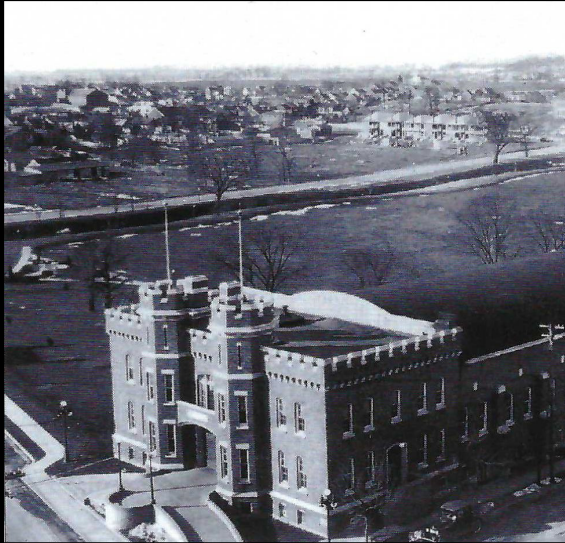




Old Town Mill on the west side of N Bentz St and located north of Carroll Creek. It was gutted by fire in 1926 paving the way for Baker Park.

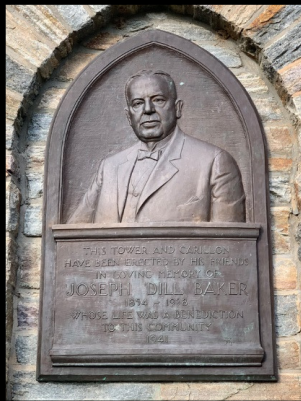


Joseph D. Baker (1854-1938)

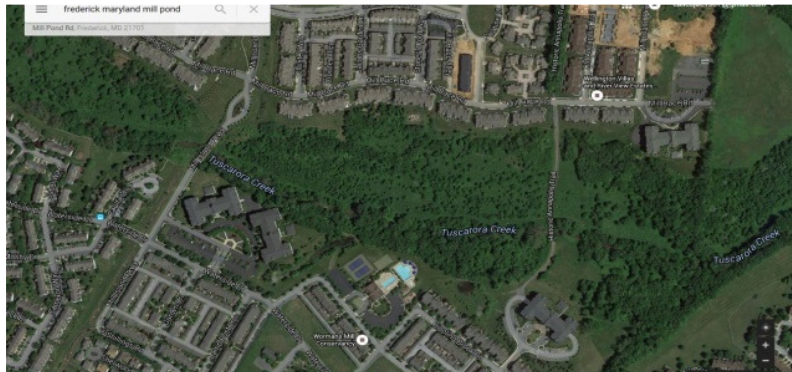


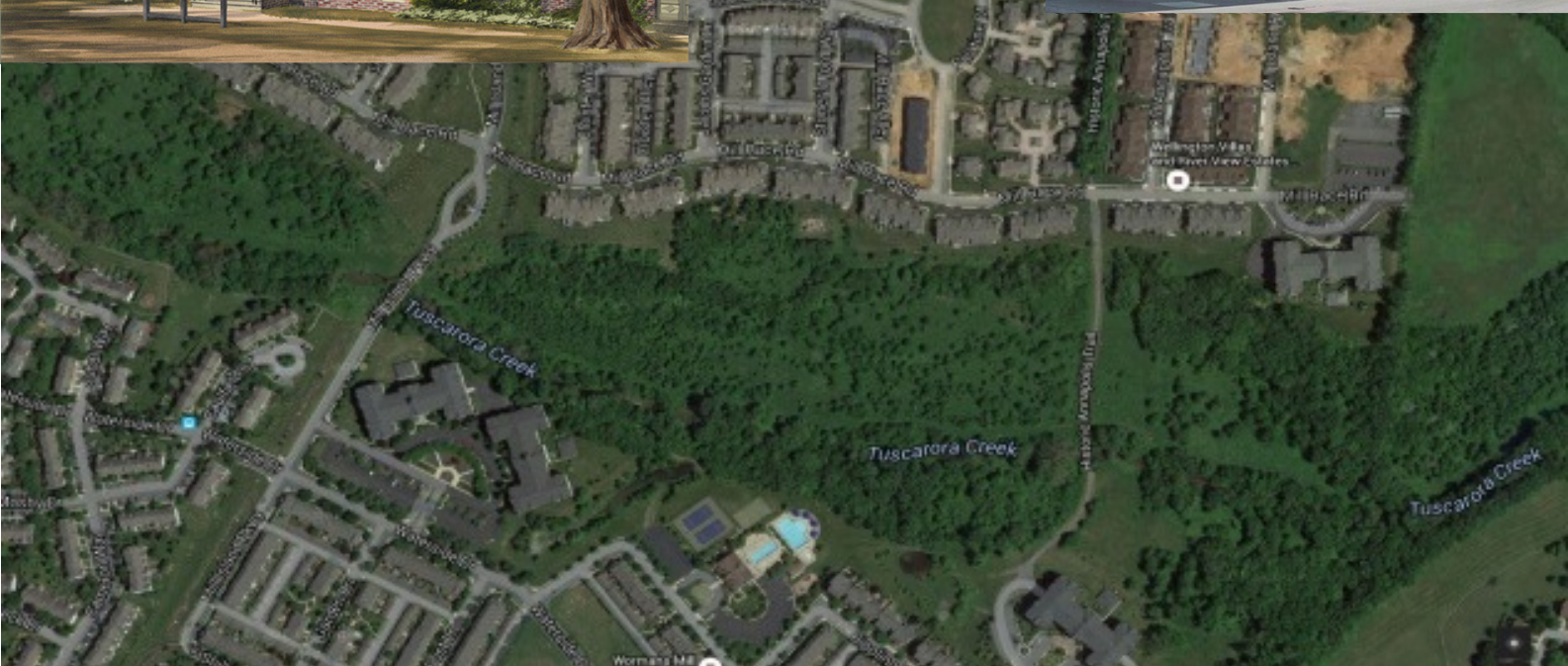
